Our Governance Minister's Report

Greetings,

Eight days before the end of January and eleven days before the deadline for the submission of Annual Reports, I have finally set to the task of writing these words for the Annual Report: Minister's Report.

I dread doing this each year – dread it because there is so much to try and capture and in the end it all seems so insignificant in the grand scheme of things, what with conflicts raging in Ukraine/Russia and Israel/Palestine and the spectacle of another Trump bid for the Presidency of the United States of America! How could anything we do in this small corner of the world have any impact. And then I am reminded of my own words – or more likely the words of someone else that I have spoken: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can."

So, with the wisdom attributed to John Wesley fresh in my mind, and an acknowledgement of my sphere of influence... here goes...

January began with the formal launch of the Harm Reduction Machine and the first steps in planning the second part of my sabbatical period. On the 14th of January we gathered in community to remember and give thanks for the life of John Houtsma. February brought with it preparation for the Annual Congregational Meeting and the formal evaluation of Seniors Sharing the Table.

Beginning the end of February and through the month of March a number of folk took part in the ProFuture Faith study that I offered and we were saddened later in the year when we learned of the death of Michael Dowd. The Mission & Ministry Task Group began its work in February and by that first full week of April, Holy Week, I was anxiously looking forward to my time of sabbath and vacation.

With Holy Week and Easter Celebrations complete, April was filled with completing projects and pastoral visits before sabbath and vacation started, and engaging in one new project, supporting a LGBTQ2S+ Group at Dorchester Penitentiary. Sunday April 30 finally arrived, and I offered leadership at our Sunday Gathering for the last time for ninety days.

My period of sabbath included a two week trip the United Kingdom, arriving in London just prior to the coronation of King Charles, and a ten-day cruise around the British Isles visiting Scotland and Ireland. This was a much needed time to unplug and reflect.

Upon my return to Canada, I took part in the Festival of Homiletics, followed by the Annual Meeting of Fundy St. Lawrence Dawning Waters Regional Council. By June 1st the trailer was opened and I spent as much of June (sabbath) and July (vacation) as possible sitting on the deck reading and spending time with family and friends. At the end of July Jennifer and I embarked on a trip Alaska that included a cruise back to Vancouver – arriving home rested and renewed, ready to engage in our respective vocations again!

On August 9th I began my 58th year and spent the rest of the month trying to find my footing as I responded to one pastoral emergency after another. People close to my age and younger seemed to be dying at an alarming rate and I found is very disarming!

The end of August and September brought additional work for the Trustees, and this drew significantly on my time and energy (and continues to do so). As teachers and students returned to School, committees at the Church began to gather again and soon we were back into our fall pattern. Regrettably, weather resulted in some changes to the PRIDE Week Events but still we celebrated the anniversary of Sackville United Church being recognized as an Affirming Ministry and took part in the parade later in the month as we marked 30 Days of Gratitude in the days leading up to Thanksgiving Sunday.

As autumn leaves were blown around by the relentless wind that seems ever-present these days, Advent was upon us and we were on our way to Christmas and the end of another full, rich and eventful year of faithful living in the Way of Jesus.

I want to extend my deep appreciation to all who have served on various Committees and Task Groups, and especially to those Elders who make up the Executive. Together you have facilitated prayer and worship, nurtured community, comforted the grieving, offered care to those ill and isolated, and joined children and youth in exploring awe and wonder. It is a deep honour to share in this ministry with you and offer leadership among you. May 2024 be as full and rich!

Our Governance Activities of the Executive

Report of the Activities of the Executive of the Congregation of Sackville United Church in 2023

Members of the Executive for 2023: Sarah Poirier (Co-Chair), Linda MacDonald (Co-Chair), Rebecca Houtsma (Communicator), Chrystal Schipper-Everill (Treasurer), Janet Hammock(Elder), Edward Knuckles (Elder), Luc Poirier (Elder), Dianna Wright (Elder), Christian Watts (Elder).

The Minister, Rev. Lloyd Bruce, also participates in all meetings in an ex-officio capacity.

The Executive will be losing 5 members who have completed their term of office, following the AGM on March 3, 2024. The Executive will be seeking 3-4 new members for a 3-year term ending in 2027.

The Executive traditionally meets on the first and third Wednesday of each month for ten months of the year – September to June.

The first meeting is designated as a Grounding meeting. These meetings play an important role for members of the Executive, as they explore spiritual matters together and build a spirit of community within the group. Responsibility for leading each meeting circulates amongst the group.

The second meeting, commonly known as the Business meeting, is dedicated to dealing with business matters related to the general operation of Sackville United Church.

As the governing body of the congregation, the Executive is committed to keeping a close connection with the congregation through the various ministry groups: Worship and Sanctuary, Ministry and Personnel, and Property/Maintenance among others. The Executive may also invite the formation of Circles of Service (Task Groups) to meet other needs as identified. Several of these groups have evolved in 2023, including the Mission and Ministry Focus Group, the Prayer Circle, the Caregivers Circle, and the Pastoral Contact Team, to name a few. We are grateful to all the committees and groups for their contribution to the community of Sackville United Church. Many will be contributing details of their missions and work to date further in this report.

In an effort to keep the congregation further up to date on the activities of the Executive, an oral report is provided during the Sunday following each business meeting.

It seems appropriate to mention the purpose and work of the Mission and Ministry Focus Group as theirs was a time-limited task requested by the Executive.

This team of five individuals was assigned the task of engaging in conversations with the those members of the congregation who chose to participate over a six-week period, in an effort to discern the mission and ministry for Sackville United Church going forward into the future.

Questions were provided as a guide to facilitate the conversations. Team members would listen carefully to what they heard, synthesize the responses, and share their summaries with the congregation.

Following the six-week process the team would create a report for the Executive and the congregation, relaying what it had learned and provide recommendations for moving forward. The full report may be obtained from the church office upon request.

Other activities the Executive participated in and oversaw during 2023 included:

March 2023

- The AGM was held on March 19, 2023, following the service.
- Linda MacDonald and Sarah Poirier reorganized their responsibilities as Co-Chairs, with each of them assuming responsibility for the Business meetings for 5 consecutive months.

April

- The Living Faith Story to be updated (Sarah Poirier, Cathering Gaw, Kendall Harrison) following the final report of the Mission and Ministry Focus Group
- Pulpit Supply arrangements to cover Rev. Bruce's Sabbatical/Vacation leave are progressing well.
- Cost of living increase of 6.3 % will be given to the Office Administrative Position and Music Director retroactive to January 1, 2023.

May

- The search for persons to fill the positions of Treasurer and Property Management Coordinator continues.
- Organization of teams for people to call if they require pastoral care during Rev. Bruce's absence.
- A financial analysis presentation from the Mission and Ministry Focus Group

June

- An upcoming change of insurance carrier
- Review of current practices around background, security, and police checks on present and prospective employees and volunteers.
- Presentation of the invitation to explore the topic of collaborative ministry from Visions United in Moncton and a number of other churches in the region.
- Report from the Board of Trustees on a bequest to SUC from the estate of a former member.
- Congregational Meeting on June 25th to vote on the final report from the Mission and Ministry Focus Group.

September

- Treasurer's Position remains unfilled. Current treasurer has agreed to stay on until the end of her term in February 2024.
- Application to the United Church Insurance has been completed and forwarded to the Board of Trustees.
- Rental of 2 office spaces on the second floor.
- Events taking place this month: Pride Week, SUC Affirming Ministry celebration, "Len and Cub" book launch, and World Wide Communion.

October

- Caretakers Charles and Sue Trenholme are willing to continue in their present position at Sackville United Church.
- Oct 29, 2023, discussions involving Sackville United Church, Visions United and Central United to start talking about building a possible collaborative model.
- Funds transferred from investments to operating account.

November

- Creation of job description for the position of Property Convenor.
- Vote in agreement with the amendment proposed by the United Church of Canada to establish an autonomous national indigenous organization within the structure of the United Church of Canada.

December

- Property and liability insurance for Sackville United Church moved to UCC United Protect program, effective January 2024 at a considerable yearly saving to SUC.
- A new member is required for the Board of Trustees.

January 2024

- Approval of funds to obtain a professional appraisal of the value of the current building
- Approval for Worship and Sanctuary to houseclean some of the rooms in the basement and re-home items that are not being used.
- Collaborative Ministry Conversations continue between Sackville United, Visions Unite and Central United regarding possibilities for collaborative ministry among the three congregations.

On behalf of the Executive, we wish to express our gratitude for the faith, trust and support placed in us by the congregation. The co-chairs are also very grateful for such a dedicated and collaborative team to work with as we progress through the year and address the multiple issues relating to Sackville United Church. We extend sincere thanks and appreciation to those who are leaving the Executive, for your wisdom and hard work over the years, and a warm welcome to those who are joining us. We move forward into the year ahead in faith.

She reported that there are many positives to find in the numbers presented.

Our regular givings increased significantly again this year, in 2022. Miscellaneous income included Sackville United Church's successful Seniors Sharing the Table Grant of \$25 000, as well as other items. Another positive was that Sackville United Church did not withdraw money from our investments to cover operating costs in 2022. Typically Sackville United Church withdraws several thousand dollars to help with those costs.

MOTION: That the financial reports for 2022, including Income Statements, Balance Sheets, and notes on those reports for Sackville United Church be adopted.

The proposed budget for Sackville United Church for 2023 was presented by Treasurer, Chrystal Schipper-Everill. A budget is an idea of where we hope to be, and to hope to have, and what we hope to spend. Chrystal Schipper-Everill shared that we anticipate being above budget in 2023 with our givings.

11. Our usual number of 75 palms branches were ordered from *Blooms Flowershop* of Sackville, the local flower shop. Any leftover palms are burned during the summer to be used for Ash Wednesday the following year.

12. Feb. 21 was Shrove Tuesday and many volunteers provided pancakes and waffles to those in attendance. Feb. 22 was Ash Wednesday, and the service was at 4 pm. Feb. 26 was the first Sunday of Lent and communion was shared.

13. The large wooden cross made by the Rev. Lloyd was placed outside between the two Main Street doors for the Easter season on April 2, Palm Sunday. April 6 was Maundy Thursday with foot washing, 6 pm supper, followed at 7 pm with a service and communion. The Good Friday service on April 7 was cancelled as there was no power due to a fire across the street. Easter Sunday, April 9 was celebrated with communion and the transferring in of membership of three persons: Stephen Poirier, Bernie Conroy, and Lindsey White-Murray.

14. A creative devotional resource, by A Sanctified Art, with the theme, seeking: honest questions for deeper faith & mission in the world, was used for Lent-Easter again this year.

15. Sept 14 started PRIDE week and the sanctuary was decorated the day before. Sept. 17 was the celebration of the Affirming *Ministry* of Sackville United Church, and on Sept 22, a book launch took place, *Len and Cub: A Queer History*, authored by Meredith Batt and Dusty Green.

16. Nov. 5 was celebrated in lieu of a traditional Remembrance Day service. There was a special lighting ceremony, using five pillar candles, to remember those who fought for our freedom. To not forget, those who served in two world wars, those who were waiting for loved ones to return home, those who died in concentration camps, those who survived the holocaust, those who are still victims of war and discrimination, displaced by war, victims of aggression, oppression, persecution, and racism.

17. Christmas decorations from the 2022 Advent season were removed on Jan. 11, with the help of the Open Sky folks.

18. Two sets of Advent candles were purchased at R. D. MacLean Company Ltd. in Moncton - 6 dark blue, 2 pink, 2 white.

19. Nov. 22 was the decorating of the sanctuary for the upcoming Christmas season with the assistance of some congregation as well as some Open Sky folk. A lunch of soup and biscuits were supplied to the workers/volunteers.

20. For Friday, Dec. 8, the sanctuary was transformed into the annual Cookie Sale, as part of Moonlight Madness, a Town of Sackville event.

21. The Advent theme was *How does a Weary World Rejoice?* The congregation was asked to participate on Sundays in a project called *Sharing Glimmers.* Nov. 26, HOPE, was the first Sunday of Advent, with communion; Dec. 3 was the celebration of PEACE; Dec. 10, JOY; and Dec. 17, the fourth Sunday of Advent, LOVE. Dec. 21 was the Blue Christmas evening gathering. There was no morning worship on Dec. 24, however, the Christmas Eve candlelight service was at 7 pm., with approximately 60 in attendance. New Years Eve, Sunday, Dec. 31, was celebrated with communion. The outdoor wooden manger scene was placed again this year between the two Main Street doors.

Circle of Service: Creative Arts for Youth

Sackville United Church Creative Arts for Youth Report for 2023

In late summer, we received approval from the Executive to move out of the basement and to utilize the upstairs space for youth and young adult activities, including the Queer Space for Adults (QS4A) and a Sunday morning Creative Arts Program for youth.

A pool table and ping pong table were moved into the upstairs space. A removable table top was created for the pool table so that it might serve a dual function for playing pool for older youth and adults and as a community work table on which the youth create projects in the Creative Arts Program.

Bean bag chairs, a large coffee table and other comfortable chairs were moved upstairs as well, and arranged to form a gathering and conversational area in the space. A cabinet was moved into the space to house art supplies and ongoing art projects.

Toys and games for both younger children and older youth and adults were also brought into the space for use during Family Games night, Creative Arts Program, and QS4A.

The space is light and bright and cozy and contains an intimate and nurturing atmosphere that is supportive of the ministry of connection and creativity that is being cultivated in the space.

Children and youth meet on alternate Sunday mornings to engage in artistic projects designed to offer opportunities for creativity as well as allowing time for participants to be together in a social setting.

The space is designed so that children and youth may spend some time in specific activities of their own choosing.

At times all children and youth need not be engaged in the same activity. It is important that time be given for children and youth to sense that what happens in their Sunday morning space can be of their own design.

As well, activities have been created so that youth and children may bring what they have learned into the active worship of regular Sunday morning services. We are

particularly thankful to Janet Hammock who introduced the children and youth to various musical instruments which lead to participation in a morning service of worship.

Rather than using a specific religious framework we believe that the spiritual development of children and youth may be developed through a process which allows children and youth some control of the process. Children are born with an innate spirituality and sense of wonder. It is important that this be nourished in an environment which allows exploration, imagination and a means of expression.

Circle of Service: Collaborative Ministry Exploration Group

Following up on the recommendations of the Mission and Ministry group that were drawn from the exploration process the SUC conducted in the summer-fall of 2023, a small group volunteered to explore the Collaborative Ministry recommendation. That small group attended some meetings hosted by Visions United in Moncton and were joined by over 13 other UCC congregations to discuss possible collaboration opportunities. After much discussion the SUC delegation agreed that the many congregations in attendance were at different stages of consideration.

As these discussions were taking place, the SUC delegation was presented a draft proposal involving sharing 2 ministers across 3 churches, utilizing technology to ensure all 3 locations would have a service to gather for each week. In order to best understand this proposal and work out whether it works for SUC, 2 people volunteered to join folks Visions United and Central United in a workgroup.

This workgroup met on Jan 25th and Jan 31st to start working out details of a possible Collaborative Ministry Model specific to our needs. This will not be a quick process, and regular updates will be presented to the SUC Executive. Before any agreement can be reached, there will be open discussion with the congregation of SUC as well as the other congregations involved.

We are confident that this process will be valuable to the future of the SUC as well as the UCC as a whole.

Circle of Service: Mission & Ministry Focus Group

Mission and Ministry Focus Group Annual Report (2023)

Six weeks of community conversations grounded in the questions: What? So What? Now What? These conversations took place in Spring, 2023, on Sunday Mornings and Monday evening via Zoom and opportunity was offered for contribution via webforms and emails.

The Mission and Ministry Task Group, together with the Executive Committee, considered all of the information gathered and offered the following recommendations, and action items, most of which have been completed or are in progress as described below:

1. Consult with other congregations regarding possible partnerships.

Immediate Action: A Task Group including Rev. Lloyd Bruce, Luc Poirier, Chrystal Schipper- Everill and others are exploring possible partnerships and different models of ministry delivery.

Near Term Action: Members of the congregation have been talking with the members of the task group about ideas for collaboration or different models of ministry.

2. Reimagine and revitalize dedicated spaces and opportunities for youth within the Tantramar community.

Immediate Action: Gary MacDonald, Rebecca Houtsma, and Stephen Poirier moved the youth spaces from the lower to upper level of the building and Gary MacDonald and Rebecca Houtsma are offering a creative arts program for youth on Sunday mornings

Near Term Action: Members of the congregation held the initiative in prayer, and those interested in leading and developing programming and potential community partnerships for youth were encouraged to talk to the leadership team.

3. Stewardship campaign and regular financial updates

With the cessation of the Lafford payments this coming year, the Focus Group believes that designing and carrying out a Stewardship campaign is a financial priority for our congregation at this time.

Immediate Action: Frank Oulton, Stewardship convener, and others, promoted the church's increased need for financial support.

Immediate Action: Short updates, as well as quarterly communications (Executive and Stewardship convener in consultation with Treasurer) were provided to the congregation.

Near Term Action: Members of the congregation were asked to consider increasing their regular financial contributions to meet our financial obligations.

4. Vision and Ministry statement

Immediate Action: In progress. Luc Poirier and Stephen Poirier are working together to revise the Vision and Ministry statement.

Medium Term Action: The Executive will share and communicate the revised Vision and Ministry Statement.

5. Affirming Ministry

Immediate Action: The Affirming Committee together with Tidewater Bookstore held a book launch of *Len & Cub* by Meredith J. Batt and Dusty Green on September 22, 2023. The committee is also hosting a PI Day Celebration on March 14, 2024.

Medium Term Action: Members of the congregation were encouraged to continue delivering ongoing programs and partnerships along with developing new ideas and opportunities to affirm the diversity we seek in our congregation and the community of Tantramar.

6. The building

Immediate Action: None needed

Near Term Action: The actual year end financial data may be found in a separate document. Other steps taken include a Commercial Appraisal, and the search for a Property Convenor.

Conclusion:

Our recommendations prioritized our affirming ministry, working with youth and families, exploring partnerships with like minded congregations, and developing a stewardship drive. We recommended these actions as a way of growing our ministry and believe that they are faithful responses to the way of life God has shown us through Jesus' life.

"Soul Sisters" – Contemplative Pathways 2023 Annual Report

We are a small group of women who meet monthly to share and listen and reflect upon each other's life journeys. We follow a process established by the Contemplative Pathways program to encourage and support the contemplative in everyday life. Each time we meet we follow a simple rhythm of alternating periods of meditative silence, sharing, silence, and response.

We have been meeting in this way since 2019, whether in person or via Zoom. Our group began because two of us heard of other such groups within our church congregation and we were instantly attracted to the model of small groups of deep spiritual friendship. (I believe my personal response was, "What? Why didn't I know these groups were happening in our congregation? Why didn't anybody tell us?") In reaching out to others in our congregation who we thought might be interested, two interested people quickly became five. Finally, we had our group and were ready to begin. We first met with a member of one of the other contemplative journeying groups to ask questions and receive some guidance on process. The five of us did not know each other well before committing to this group, but each of us was interested in the contemplative model and the opportunity to be in a circle of attentiveness, support, and trust.

Five years on, this group continues to offer a holy time apart in which we can express and explore what is happening in our lives and spirits. The group has been a blessing of insight, growth, and deepening friendship.

If you are interested in forming a contemplative journeying group, 4 to 5 people is optimal, and written guidance of the process is available. And, of course, those of us already involved in a group would be happy to meet with you to answer your questions. We want to make sure you know that these groups are happening and are easy to initiate, so that no one has to say, "Why didn't anybody tell us!"

As part of our commitment as an Affirming Congregation we are required to educate ourselves so we may continue to educate our Faith Community. The Affirming Committee, a small group formed in 2022 to undertake this work, continued this outreach in 2023.

The book launch planned for the fall of 2022, which was postponed due to a hurricane, took place at SUC with tremendous success in the fall of 2023 as part of Pride Week in Sackville. Sackville United Church, Tidewater Books, and Goose Lane Editions partnered to host a special author presentation of *Len & Cub: A Queer History* by Meredith J. Batt (archivist at the Provincial Archives in Fredericton, president of the Queer Heritage Initiative of New Brunswick) and Dusty Green (founder of the Queer Heritage Initiative of New Brunswick). They delivered an engaging talk and PowerPoint presentation about their adventures researching this beautiful story, followed by a Q&A and discussion.

Bruce Moore, a member of the Affirming Committee, received funds from SUC to support his taking a two-part course: "LGBTQ and Scriptural Interpretations" followed by "LGBTQ Issues in Pastoral Care" with Dr. Teresa Hornsby. Bruce shared some of what he had learned with the congregation in a public presentation.

Of special importance in November was the establishment of The Sackville United Church Affirming Fund. With terms of reference similar to those of the Benevolent Fund, it is available to assist those in need in the local community, and intended for the benefit of individuals or families who are experiencing financial difficulty in connection with specific, urgent 2SLGBTQIA issues.

Circle of Service: Communications

As online/hybrid worship has been established as a more permanent part of our regular worship, we continue to work toward the stated mandate of communications at SUC of "facilitating good communication both within the congregation and from the congregation to the larger community". Sunday services are regularly joined live and/or watched after the fact by people within our church community who would not otherwise be able to participate in regular in-person worship, as well as by people across Canada; many of these people have personal connections to congregation members, but others have simply discovered our worship online and are now regular attendees or one-time special guests. For example, one of our services this year was attended by the United Church of Canada General Secretary Michael Blair.

Some new and continuing initiatives in the past year include:

- Continued "Monday Musings" and weekly announcement emails and website posts (monthly in the summer) to keep the congregation informed on upcoming events
- Continued presence of a dedication person at the A/V console to change slides, change camera/slide formatting for online streaming, and monitor the online Facebook feed to foster fuller participation for online attendees
- Installation and mixing of a microphone for the choir for both in-person and online sound
- Hyperlinks on the frontpage of the website to make accessing pages more simplified

Rev. Lloyd is invaluable in generating colourful and effective posters/pictures for church events and is our main source for operation and troubleshooting of our livestream technology barring sound. Jennie continues to run the sound board from the remote iPad near the piano, with occasional consultation by Chris Meaney for setup, installation, and troubleshooting. Two major instances of sound issues occurred this year, both of which resulted from software incompatibility between the sound board, laptop, and our video streaming software. Chris Meaney has indicated that eventually we will need a new soundboard and/or laptop, and suggested a slightly more simplified setup.

Trustees 2023 Annual Report

The Trustees met six times during the year. Four of these meetings were regular meeting and two were special meetings.

The Trustees continued to communicate with John Lafford about repair and relocation of the cemetery sign and the painting/signing of handicap parking spaces. Unfortunately, there is no progress to report on either of these items.

The Trustees met with Adam Dempsey of Scotia Wealth Management in February to review the performance of the investment fund. Though the fund decreased in value in the previous year, it still outperformed the performance benchmark for the fund. The fund has averaged a net return of 5.7% since inception in 2013.

At the request of the Executive, \$15000 was transferred from the investment fund (unconstrained account) to the operating account of the Church.

In late 2022, The United Church of Canada launched a new insurance program called UCC United Protect aimed at providing United Church ministries with more affordable and accessible property and liability insurance coverage. The Trustees spent considerable time reviewing the program and made application for a quotation in September. As a result of this work, the Trustees recommended to the Executive in December, 2023 that the property and liability insurance for Sackville United Church be moved to the UCC United Protect program effective January 31, 2024. It is expected that this change will provide annual savings in excess of \$2,000.

The Trustees also spent considerable time during the year reviewing and responding to a proposal by the Trustee of the Catherine Smith trust/estate to possibly wind up the trust early and disbursing the proceeds of the trust/estate to the beneficiaries. This is a complicated matter and the Trustees continue to work on behalf of the congregation to ensure that any such wind up is done responsibly and that all legal considerations have been met.

Rockport United Church 2023 Annual Report

This is the first time since Covid started that the church has been able to have its three church services and an annual meeting. Services were held in April, October and December with the annual meeting in June.

Nancy Read had been given permission to purchase a portable toilet to replace the one which was on loan from the Rockport Community Association. That was ordered after the March service but has never arrived. It would probably be good idea to re-order this item.

The church was broken into in the spring. The couple spent at least one night there. The door latches to both the church and outbuilding were destroyed and the locks removed. After burning the wood available in the church, they burned hymn books and other loose materials available.

The quilt that covered the organ is missing and one of the artificial flower arrangements was destroyed. There were never any fingerprints taken, and although the people were caught, we were informed by the RCMP that charges for this would not be laid as they had no convicting evidence that they were the people in the church. New door latches and locks have been purchased and installed. Melbourne Read cleaned the church after this happened.

The church has lost one of the Trustees with the passing of Alberta Harris in 2019. There are now six Trustees - the four remaining and two additional people appointed at the annual meeting.

Ken Tower has kept the lawn mowed for the past year.

Report: Treasurer's Report

<u>Treasurer's Report to the Annual Meeting of Sackville United Congregation</u> <u>2023 Annual Report</u>

2023 saw a slight increase in regular givings of 1.7%. This is certainly cause for celebration! Each year the regular givings continue to increase, and this is not the case for many congregations. This year also was one of the highest recorded totals for SUC in supporting charitable projects in out wider community.

Unfortunately, the increase in givings is not covering the total increases expenses. Total salaries saw an increase of 5% over last year, with annual raises. Our occupancy costs were also up 5% over last year.

2023 was the last year with a Lafford payment. The \$25,000 Lafford payment and \$15,000 transferred from the investments both helped cover operating costs. We have continued our partnership with Visions United Church to undertake a mutual review of books. This partnership is enormously beneficial, and I have learned a lot during these meetings with Visions United.

The executive and congregation continue to look at ways to continue to thrive as a community and how to best bridge the gap between income and expenses. This is my final report as treasurer. I want to thank the entire congregation for your support and kindness while I served as treasurer.

I would also like to thank every member of the executives that I have served with. The friendships, learning, caring and support that we shared over the years is extraordinary. The Sackville United Church Executive is certainly an amazing group! I have grown as a person and in my faith by sitting at the table with them.
